Active Pursuit of God:

I don't know if your family is like mine when it comes to taking pictures, but in every household of my extended family there is a box or boxes of old photographs. Yes, actual paper pictures, no digital stuff in there. The box or boxes are usually hidden away in a closet or cabinet somewhere, out of sight, out of mind. I usually "discover" them again when I'm looking for something else. I don't know what it is about the pictures, but I'll start thumbing through them and am emotionally swept away in memories.

Pictures taken at this time of the year, Easter, I find pictures of 4 kids, 2 boys and 2 girls, dressed in matching clothes. Mom made the girls' dresses and the boys' shirts out of the same material. The boys have fresh haircuts and the girls' hairdos are freshly coiffed. All the pictures are taken outside in the sunshine and beautiful Spring weather.

Some of the pictures show us arranged as stair-steps, others with our Easter baskets, full of the eggs we decorated the previous afternoon. Decorating the eggs was a major production, Mom would hard-boil the eggs and give each one of us the same number of eggs to decorate. We would arrange the bowls with the dye in them, with a lot of newspaper under them to absorb the spillage. We could use a wax pencil to make designs on the eggs before dipping into the dye and the dye wouldn't penetrate the dye, leaving white where we drew the designs. We always made a mess, but it was fun.

Easter Sunday always began by going to church. There, everyone was dressed in mostly new clothes and several ladies wore their Easter bonnets. I remember them as being brightly colored, big and frilly. After church, we had a big lunch, usually with some relatives coming over. Then, finally, after lunch it was time for the Easter egg hunt! There weren't any prizes for the "Most Gathered" or any "Golden" eggs, just the thrill of trying to find all of the eggs. Then once again, Mom would count all the eggs and make sure everyone had the same number in their baskets.

Easter, a time of new beginnings and new life. Only Christians could take an event, the crucifixion of a blameless man, and tum it into the most significant event in human history. Our God sent His only Son to die on the cross for our sins and then rise from the grave so that we could have a new beginning and a new life. Glory be to God!

Why not pray with Jesus for just a half-hour as we await Easter morning?


Mission Moment

Stewardship of Time

Each of us have been given enough time to accomplish God's purpose for us on this planet. The Scriptures exhort us to invest our time wisely, reminding us that God determines the length of our stay on earth. "Therefore be careful how you walk, not as unwise men, but as wise, making the most of your time, because the days are evil" (Eph. 5:15-16). Toward the end of his life, Moses prayed, "So teach us to number our days, that we may present to Thee a heart of wisdom" (Ps. 90:12).

Time is our most valuable asset, but without a proper perspective, we will spend it foolishly. A biblical perspective on time involves several things: (1) Life is brief, and we cannot be presumptuous about the future (Jas. 4:14). (2) The eternal gives meaning to the temporal (Rom. 13:11; 2 Cor. 4:18). (3) Like other assets, our time is owned by God (Ps. 31:15). (4) We must be sensitive to opportunities so that we can make the most of them (Eccles. 8:5; Col. 4:5). (5) Our use of time will reflect our priorities (Matt. 6:19-21,34).

Just as it is wise to budget our financial resources (see below), it is also wise to budget our use of time. Most time is wasted not in hours, but in minutes. If we do not regularly assess the way we spend our 168 hours per week, our schedules will get cluttered with activities that may be good, but not the best. How much quality time do we spend with the Lord, with our spouse, with our children, and with our non-Christian friends? God wants us to be faithful stewards, not squanderers, of the time He has given us.


Service Leader: Barbara Lynn




